It was so lovely to have so many parents pop in to read and of course for the children to have OTTER time to read for pleasure, buddy reading as well as Reading for Meaning Sessions; reading was certainly a clear focus across the school! Although we want our children to make good progress in this pivotal subject which open doors to learning across the curriculum, and is hence a school priority, we also want them to love reading now and in the future!

Sports Relief is coming up next week and we are concerned that we are collecting for so many charities etc that we have planned opportunities for inter-house activities in PE lessons and on Friday, children are welcome to wear their house Tee shirts with their tracksuits!

Linked to both a love of poetry and developing oracy, the children will be invited to participate in our termly poetry recitals; last term was very successful and the children chose from a selection of poems. This term the children can choose a poem they simply would like to share! They will perform their chosen poem w/c 16th March and final poetry winners will share their poem at celebration assembly on 19th March. I am already looking forward to this event!

Some of our 'always' children visited me for cake and Golden Tea; a highlight for me! This recognises children who simply consistently demonstrate our values. Children are chosen on merit and may visit more than once; sadly not everyone can or will be chosen. The children were surprised, excited and a delight to chat to (although Year 6 were pretty subdued in comparison to the others!)

This week we have focussed heavily on the progression and development of writing across the school. The senior leadership team and English leaders worked with L. Pickton, a consultant for the day, and he delivered a training session to the staff team during our weekly training session! We are now excited to put our learning into practice and map out when we will teach certain skills and genres of writing to make strong and valuable links with science, RE, history, geography etc! This week our reception teachers visited an outstanding school to share expertise and ideas; what an amazing opportunity! As you know, our school focussed on developing how we teach mathematics last year; our journey continues and our maths leads visited schools on Wednesday as part of the Surrey Maths Hub research project.

Today. I am off site, working with my head teacher colleagues across the Ember Learning Trust to explore further opportunities for our children and staff as well as sharing priorities and strategies - all of our schools are focussing on curriculum development due to the recent new Ofsted Framework.


NAS support group meeting

Coronavirus (COVID-19)

As I am sure many of you will have seen over the weekend, there have been media reports about Coronavirus in the UK and in Surrey, and many of you will be concerned. Although this is a concern for us all it is very important that we work together; following government and Public Health as well as Surrey's guidance. I am also keen that we safeguard our children's mental well being by remaining calm, keeping our conversations with the children factual and giving them guidance re hand washing and the use of tissues.

The advice to us from Public Health England and Surrey County Council remains the same and is as follows:-

- 1) Where a suspected case has been in a childcare or educational setting, there is no need to close the setting or send other learners or staff home.
- 2) Even if there is a confirmed case in your childcare or educational setting, in most cases, closure of the childcare or education setting will be unnecessary and advice would be provided by Public Health England.
- 3) As always, everyone should continue to promote good hand and respiratory hygiene:
 - Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after using public transport. Use a sanitiser gel if soap and water are not available.
 - Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands.
 - Always carry tissues with you and use them to catch your cough or sneeze, then bin the tissue and wash your hands (or use a sanitiser gel).
 - Avoid close contact with people who are unwell.

Remember, if you have any direct medical concerns, to contact NHS 111.

The Department for Education have set up a Coronavirus helpline (tel 0800 046 8687) for queries relating to schools and other educational establishments in England. Lines are open Monday to Friday from 8am to 6pm.

Please be assured that when there is a confirmed case, Public Health England (PHE) use the method of contact tracing to prevent the infection spreading further.
